Director's Report

We continue to accept walk-ins. We have over 50 appointment slots per day, which can be filled by walk-ins. The Community Outreach Committee is interested in moving away from the appointment-based system. We did agree to establish an ad-hoc committee to discuss the trap neuter release ("TNR") program and the shelter appointment system. The ad-hoc committee reached consensus so far on maintaining the current appointment system but incorporating tours.

OCAC is subject to litigation about animal welfare practices. OCAC has prevailed against the restraining order, but litigation will continue and more process remains ahead. As a result, standard operations will continue uninterrupted.

We have 94.2% dog save rate and 70.35% cat save rate for January 1, 2022 to September 30, 2022.

The animal care industry is seeing a shortage of veterinary services and high costs due to inflation and supply issues. This is a nationwide problem. Our adoption rates remain consistent.

Budget Update

We're trending at about 3.2% over budget and we're watching this closely. This is not unusual for the first quarter of a new contract year. Cost increases are related to rising wages and increased intake.

Grant Award

OCAC has been awarded a \$142,094 grant to expand capacity for spay/neuter services. Pet owners reclaiming animals from the shelter may receive spay/neuter service. More info on this soon.

Operational Update

Kitten season is upon us. Pan Leukopenia is very contagious and it's difficult to manage at the shelter because its so contagious. We're also dealing with foster fatigue.

Most of the dogs we have at the shelter are large dogs, many of which have medical and/or behavioral waivers. This makes it more difficult to adopt.

We now have 7-day a week coverage by staff veterinarians in-house.

Adoption Survey Pilot Results

- 97% reported being greeted by a friendly customer service agent
- 66% of adopters pre-scheduled their visit
- 34% of adopters walked in for a visit
- On average 88% were seen within 15 minutes of visiting time
- 90% complimented Animal Care Attendants to help make an informed adoption decision
- 98% of adopters would recommend OC Animal Care to family/friends

OC Animal Care Pending Litigation

Animal welfare is the focus of heightened public attention both locally and nationwide. You may have heard that litigation has been filed against OCAC and currently remains pending.

- In response to the Plaintiffs' allegations, OCAC submitted a declaration to the Court demonstrating that OCAC's practices meet or exceed industry standards.
 - Plaintiffs' request for a temporary restraining order was denied by the Court on November 1.
- As litigation continues to unfold, you may notice an increase in media coverage for OCAC.
 - On November 22, the OC Register requested our response to the allegations raised in the lawsuit.
 - While it is OCAC's policy not to comment on pending litigation, we were able to provide the reporter with public records, including a copy of OCAC's opposition papers to the Plaintiffs' request for a temporary restraining order.
- In line with our usual practice whenever this happens, the matter has been referred to the Orange County Counsel's Office. Our team will continue our daily operations with no interruptions.

Budget Update

FY 22/23 Update

- First quarter services invoices have been mailed.
- Based on actual expenses and revenues through Oct. 31, full-year Net Costs are projected above budget by about \$485K (+3.2%)
 - Salary & Benefit expenses are higher
 - Total filled positions have increased as anticipated
 - MOU driven COLAs commenced Q1 FY 22/23
 - Intake has increased 24.9% for cats & dogs for Q1 comparison FY 21/22 vs FY 22/23
 - Charge days have increased by 47.5% for cats and dogs (Jan Oct for comparison of 21 vs 22)
 - Pharmaceuticals, Medical Supplies and Animal Feed continue to increase
- City level full year Net Cost projections will be calculated after 2nd quarter invoices are generated
- Expenses and revenue are being closely monitored

California For All Animals Grant Award

Grant funds awarded to OCAC

- Funder: University of California, Davis Campus School of Veterinary Medicine on behalf of its Koret Shelter Medicine Program in connection with the California for All Animals statewide animal shelter assistance program
- Support to receive: OCAC has been awarded a grant in the amount of \$142,094
- Purpose of work: OCAC will expand capacity for spay/neuter to include offering the service to pet owners who are reclaiming their animals from the shelter
- Scope of work: Specific to dogs and cats; limited to pets brought in via field response or stray by a good Samaritan and subsequently redeemed by their original owner
