

2014 GET SAFE Academy – Preparing Kids for Today's Tough Issues

The City and the Orange County Sheriff's Department have partnered with GET SAFE, an organization dedicated to educating and training kids on safety skills and awareness techniques, to bring free, interactive training to K-6 students in Lake Forest.

The GET SAFE academy offers a unique blend of counseling, education, interaction, physical training, and humor. The curriculum focuses on physical (strength, cardio, nutrition), mental (personal and verbal defense skills, situational awareness), and emotional (self-awareness, self-confidence, self-control) development designed to empower kids.

The academy will be held on Wednesday nights for four weeks, starting May 21 and ending June 11, at Lake Forest City Hall (25550 Commercentre Drive). Classes begin at 6:00 p.m. and will last approximately 1¹/₂ hours. Lake Forest residents must register by Friday, May 16. Once registration is full, interested participants will be placed on a waiting list. Registration is available in person at City Hall (2nd floor) or online at *online.activecommunities.com/lfreconline*. Light refreshments will be provided.

Alton Parkway Closure

WHAT:

Alton Parkway between Monarch and Catalina will be closed to thru traffic to facilitate the movement of dirt from the south side to the north side of Alton as Shea Baker prepares for mass grading operations in the next few months. Although this is a temporary inconvenience, motorists have greatly benefited from having this segment of Alton Parkway opened three years ahead of the original schedule.

WHEN:

Alton Parkway will be closed in late July for approximately two months and is expected to reopen in early October.

WHAT TO EXPECT:

Advanced notification signs will be strategically placed along affected roadways several weeks before the closure. Motorists are encouraged to plan ahead and use alternate detour routes including Rancho Parkway South, Bake Parkway, and Commercentre Drive to reconnect with Alton Parkway.

Scam Alert: Residential Address Curb Painting

The Orange County Sheriff's Department warns residents to be aware of a common scam circulating through neighborhoods – address curb painting. The scam is perpetrated by individuals who paint your curb and then demand payment, even though residents decline or did not request the service.

The City does not have a residential address curb painting program. If an individual or company paints your curb, residents are under no obligation to pay. Any payment is strictly voluntary. If you are interested in hiring a contractor to freshen up your curb, check with your Homeowner's Association for specific requirements or contact the City to obtain a permit before starting work.

A Burning New Trend – S –

A growing new trend has some filling up a cartridge rather than lighting up a cigarette. Electronic cigarettes commonly referred to as "vape pens" or "ecigs" are battery-powered devices that turn liquid nicotine or "e-juice" into vapor.

E-cigarettes and flavored nicotine are easily purchased at gas stations, local shops, and online. Currently, California has prohibited the sale of e-cigarettes to individuals under the age of 18 but otherwise e-cigarettes remain largely unregulated. They have gained popularity among adolescents and are appearing on school campuses. Some school districts, including Saddleback Valley



he percentage of U.S. middle and high school students who use e-cigarettes more than doubled from 2011 to 2012.

Unified School District, have banned e-cigarettes from school campuses. While studies are being conducted regarding the potential risks and benefits of e-cigarettes, parents are encouraged to have open conversations about both e-cigarettes and regular cigarettes to raise awareness about these products. At this time, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is considering regulating e-cigarettes under the same category as tobacco products. Changes to Toll Roads Gives Drivers a Non-Stop Experience

There's no need to search around for exact change anymore while driving on the 73, 133, 241, or 261 toll roads because the Transportation Corridor Agencies (TCA) will remove all cash collections starting May 14, 2014. Toll road drivers will have more payment options in addition to the traditional FasTrak method. With the TCA's newly introduced ExpressAccount, images of a vehicle's license plate are captured and the appropriate toll is collected from the linked account. In addition, a One-Time Toll allows customers to pay within 48-hours of a



trip. New FasTrak and ExpressAccount customers can earn a free week on the toll roads by creating a new account by May 11 using promo code FREETOLL. For more information or to sign up for an ExpressAccount, visit *www.thetollroads.com*.

Green Spring Cleaning and Gardening

Springtime means spring cleaning! Or, if you have a green thumb, it is also a good time to start gardening. Here are some helpful tips to clean your home and establish a thriving garden while protecting our local environmental resources and reducing pressures of the drought.

Green Cleaning

Wash dirt and debris from your furniture on the lawn or other landscaped areas to save water and keep runoff from flowing into the storm drain system while providing plants with a drink. Secondly, use a broom and dustpan to clean your patio and outdoor walkways instead of a hose to prevent debris from entering the storm drains. Remember, anything that drains to the gutter ends up in our local creeks, lakes, and the ocean.

Gardening Pest Control

An effective combination of preventative maintenance and green insect repellant can keep insects out of your home and garden. Insects are looking for food, water, and shelter and if you eliminate these necessities, they won't forage your home and garden.

A variety of common household items and kitchen ingredients such as crushed mint, bay leaves, garlic, and cayenne pepper are good natural repellents, especially for aphids. Chop six cloves of garlic and mix them with one tablespoon of baby shampoo in one quart of water to create an effective repellent for rose bushes. Sprinkle coffee and eggshells around the base of plants to repel ants, snails, and slugs. This treatment is great on azaleas, rhododendrons, camellias, gardenias and even blueberries! To keep



wasps away from ripening fruit, fill several cans with equal parts of ammonia and water, and hang them on your fruit trees.

PREPARING FOR THE UPCOMING 2014 ELECTION

The June 3 Statewide Direct Primary Election and the November 4 General Municipal Election are right around the corner! If you need to update your voter information because you have moved or changed your name or party affiliation since the last election, this can be done in just a few minutes at *www.ocvote.com*. The deadline to register to vote for the June 3 Statewide Direct Primary Election is May 19. Residents turning 18 on or before Election Day will be eligible to vote.

Local Elections

The next City Council election is on November 4. There are three Council seats open, each for a four-year term. The nomination period for local candidates is July 14 to August 8. Residents interested in running for the Lake Forest City Council must:

- Be a citizen of the United States.
- Be a registered voter and resident of Lake Forest.
- Be 18 years of age or older.
- Take the oath of office.


