City staff never stopped working for residents during the coronavirus closures. And now as the State and County are moving toward reopening, this coming fiscal year is bringing new and renovated parks, smooth new streets and even a new way for the City to share information with residents.

Our biggest news is the upcoming completion of Portola Park off Glenn Ranch Road, opening in November. The 6.4-acre park brings dog runs, pickleball and more. The City's 31st park is another we can all be proud of, especially because it will be completed during such unprecedented times.

The City Council and staff faced budget challenges brought by reduced sales-tax revenue and hotel occupancy taxes head on. We cut all travel and instituted numerous other changes. Even The Leaflet wasn't immune from change. We will now publish this magazine four times a year, combined with our Community Services class listings that were previously in a separate publication, Leisure Times. Altogether, we reduced our General Fund spending by 6 percent.

What we did not cut is our drive to continue serving residents and ensuring Lake Forest is a great place to live and work. We anticipate completing many important projects this fiscal year, including:

- Renovating Cherry, Darrin, Montbury, and Pebble Creek parks
- Revitalizing Neighborhood Watch, Business Watch, and Hotel Watch programs
- Resurfacing streets in Zone C between Trabuco and Jeronimo – and in Zone G, which is Portola Hills
- Launching Lake Forest TV on Cox channel 857, which will broadcast Council meetings and City news

Many of these are major initiatives that come after months, if not years, of preparation and planning. But life is made of big things and little things – that is why I am excited that we're also bringing back our popular Community Services sports camps, dance classes, yoga, and music lessons classes in the Fall.

We thanked you many times during the coronavirus pandemic for your patience. While the pandemic isn't over, I hope you find these new projects make the "new normal" a bit more bearable.

CITY RESPONDS TO CORONAVIRUS

City Hall remained open to provide essential services to residents throughout the coronavirus pandemic, although other City facilities closed in March. Lake Forest diligently followed the guidance of the Governor's Office and County of Orange to keep residents as safe as possible as COVID-19 spread.


The City also kept parks open, although playgrounds were closed as required by the Governor. Throughout the pandemic, the City coordinated with the County and other cities to ensure agencies provided consistent messages to residents. Although the City has faced wildfires in the past, the pandemic presented unparalleled challenges, but the City continued to serve residents. Building permits and inspections continued, in some cases virtually. Park, street and other capital-improvement projects moved forward. The City's Community Services staff worked with members of the Community Emergency Response Team to call seniors and ensure they were OK.

The City also strives to keep residents updated on the complex and changing situation, with videos from the Mayor and City Manager, as well as social media and website posts.

COMMUNITY HEROES RISE DURING PANDEMIC


As the coronavirus swept through Southern California, Lake Forest residents were like everybody else: trying to keep up with the often-changing information they needed to keep themselves and their families safe.



The Dubois family created colorful eggs that allowed kids to go on drive-by Easter egg hunts. The El Toro Mobile Estates Recreation Club made masks, as did others. Jeanne Fendel sold masks to raise money for ALS, while Kristie and Terry Anderson gave their mask proceeds to the Boys and Girls Club. Christine Rousselle donated hers to medical professionals. Have you ever wanted to see the City's checkbook?

Well, now you can. To boost transparency with residents, the City partnered with ClearGov to create an online overview of the City's checkbook, revenues, expenditures, and even demographics.

The City's budget process was already transparent. The City Council holds a public budget workshop in May, adopting the budget at a meeting in June. The City's fiscal year runs from July to June. Additionally, the City's warrant list, essentially the check register, is included on City Council agendas for approval.

But the Cleargov software makes it even easier to understand local government budgets. The Lake Forest webpage shows the adopted revenue budget for 2019-20 was \$51 million. Revenue sources such as taxes, charges for services, and licenses/permits are broken down in clear and concise charts.

City expenditures have similar tools. The 2019-20 fiscal year budget for City expenditures was \$49.6 million, and Cleargov breaks down spending for each department into a pie chart to illustrate the City's expenses.

The demographics show the City population is 82,911, the median house value is \$621,000 and the median household income is \$104,449. The data is gathered from several sources and is from 2018, the last year all of the information was updated. Many other categories of demographic data is available, too.

The Lake Forest Civic Center received the Parks & Recreation Project of the Year award from the American Society of Civil Engineers. The Civic Center represents a 20-year vision and partnership between residents, landowners, and the City.

The City celebrated the grand opening of the Lake Forest Civic Center in January. The 6.4-acre campus, built without long-term debt for approximately \$80 million, includes four buildings totaling approximately 100,000 square feet. The campus is centered around a 50-foot clock tower, reminiscent an early town square. The Civic Center was ultimately designed to be the place where residents can enjoy social programs, share special events, and participate in local government.

For decades, noise from airport operations at Marine Corps Air Station El Toro mandated that adjacent properties in the City be zoned commercial/industrial. When the Marine base closed and plans for a public airport were rejected, the City negotiated with landowners who wanted to change their property zoning to residential. The resulting development agreements produced impact fees that paid for the \$80 million Sports Park and Recreation Center, which opened in 2014, and, finally, the Civic Center.

The developer fees allowed the City to complete the Civic Center without incurring any debt. Because of that, Lake Forest remains one the most financially healthy large cities in California.

The community now has a dedicated place for seniors in The Clubhouse. Other amenities include a Community Center, Performing Arts Center/Council Chambers, and City Hall/Police Services building. The campus is called the community's "100 Year Home" because of the timeless architecture, extensive use of steel and stone construction, and because it will become a gathering place for the community.

NOVEMBER 2020 COMPLETES CITY'S TRANSITION TO DISTRICT ELECTIONS

OC will again use Vote Centers

Lake Forest voters in District 1 and District 5 will cast ballots for City Council representatives in the November 2020 General Election, completing the City's transition to district elections.

The change began with the 2018 election, after the City faced a lawsuit based on the Voters Rights Act.

Residents will again cast ballots by mail, ballot collection boxes, or in Vote Centers. All voters will again receive a ballot for the November 3 Presidential General Election, giving them the choice of mailing in their ballot or dropping it in a ballot collection box. OC Registrar of Voters Neal Kelley recognized the challenges presented

by the coronavirus pandemic and made plans to safely accommodate those who want to vote in person.

Vote Centers in Lake Forest will include the Civic Center, Sports Park, and libraries. Ballot collection boxes are at the Sports Park, Heroes Park and elsewhere in the City. See https://www.ocvote.com/voting for updated locations.

The Registrar of Voters pivoted quickly as the pandemic expanded and began acquiring personal protective equipment in response to COVID-19. Examples of changes due to COVID-19 include enhancing e-filing options for candidates, for Vote Center Customer Service Representatives to complete a significant portion of their training online and leveraged technology to create remote public election observation opportunities.

In addition, each in-person voting location will have detailed plans for disinfecting, maintaining physical distance, and will have personal protective equipment and increased signage on-site.

In a life-threatening emergency, the Orange County Sheriff's Department and Orange

County Fire Authority will use Alert OC to share critical information via text, email, and voice calls. Be sure you and your loved ones are registered for Alert OC at www.alertoc.org. Also ensure your information is updated if you have moved since registering, as the system is geographically based.



The City uses Nixle to share important news with residents. You can receive

the information via text, email, or, in an emergency, voice calls. Text LakeForest or your ZIP code to 888777 to register, or sign up at www.nixle.com.

The City of Lake Forest smart-phone app is available in the App Store and Play Store.

Not only does it provide important City information, it also allows users to report issues such as potholes or graffiti directly to City staff. For important updates, the app allows push messages to users as well.

BE WILDFIRE READY!

Just as firefighters train to prepare for wildfires, residents need to prepare, too. The Orange County Fire Authority urges everyone to follow "Ready," "Set," "Go!"

READY

Being ready means taking responsibility to prepare before a wildfire erupts, so your home - and your family - are ready. Removing vegetation from around your home is one of the best ways to get ready, and you can harden your home, too. Hardening your home means protecting it from embers, which can fly more than a mile. Ensure your eaves are protected, along with fences, decks and other flammable material around your home.

SET

Being set means packing your car with your emergency items. Stay aware of the latest information by signing up for AlertOC at www.alertoc.org or texting "LakeForest" to 888777. Create an emergency kit that has enough supplies and belongings for every member of your home for at least three days. Don't forget medications and your pets. Develop a plan with your family and practice it! Plan out meeting places and it's best to have an out-of-state contact that family members can check in with via text. Even when it is tough to get a call through within California, texting outside the state can still work.

Go means go. You don't have to wait until you're told to evacuate by authorities. Leave early enough to avoid being caught in fire, smoke, or road congestion. Keep the map on the other side of this page handy and if you are advised to leave, don't hesitate.

Drowning is the leading cause of accidental death for children under 5 and among the top five leading causes of death people under 18, both in Orange County and California. In 2019, 114 people drown in OC; 33 were children ages 0-4 and 33 were adults over the age of 50. Thirty-eight of the 2019 drownings took place at an OC beach, 30 within community pools and spas and 27 in backyard pools or spas. For more information.

PORTOLA PARK READIES FOR OPENING



Portola Park, the City's 31st park, is scheduled to open in November at Saddleback Ranch and Glenn Ranch Roads.

Portola brings many new park amenities to Lake Forest: a large, universally accessible playground, outdoor pickleball courts and a sand volleyball court. The park also includes restrooms, expansive dog parks and incredible children's play equipment.

For active residents, the tiered park creates a youth sports field, exercise equipment and a walking path around the park. More than 50 parking spaces provide plenty of space for park users.

One of the greatest amenities, however, is natural: an incredible view over the City.

CHERRY PARK RENOVATIONS UNDERWAY



The City's Neighborhood Park Improvement Plan continues, with a universally accessible play surface being added to Cherry Park. The surface allows children wheelchairs or other tools to help them walk will be able to safely enjoy the play equipment.

A shade structure is also being added to the park, along with an ADA-accessible parking spot on the street. The colorful iconic bridge will remain and is getting a face-lift as well.

The City Council in 2018 approved renovation to 10 neighborhood parks after a dozen workshops and meetings. Other parks in the project are: Borrego Overlook, Darrin, Montbury, Peachwood, Pebble Creek, Rancho Serrano, Regency, Sundowner, and Vintage. See https://

Members of the City's Community Emergency Response team volunteered to help remove food from donors' vehicles and sort it for the bins during the August event. Sports Park Entry Named in Honor of **Arenado**

Those entering the Sports Park from Portola Drive might notice something a little different. The entry street has been named in honor of 2009 El Toro High School graduate and Major League Baseball star Nolan Arenado.

More than 100 Lake Forest Little League players received commemorative baseballs autographed by All Star third baseman Nolan Arenado on February 8, during the unveiling ceremony for "Nolan Arenado Drive."

Another 200 parents and friends of the Arenado family watched from the bleachers of Field 4 at the Sports Park as the City Council unveiled the blue "Nolan Arenado Drive" sign with Nolan's number and year he graduated from El Toro High School. Nolan is an all-star third baseman in Major League Baseball.

Nolan's mother, Millie, spoke during the ceremony about how proud the family is of Nolan and how proud they are to be Lake Forest residents. Nolan also addressed the crowd, recalling his favorite memories growing up in the City. Afterward, he signed the commemorative baseballs for the Little Leaguers and even took pictures with them.



OLYMPIAN SPEAKS

AT BREAKFAST

Olympic Gold Medalist and El Toro High School graduate Kaitlin Sandeno Hogan treated more than 100 community and City leaders to an inspirational story of overcoming adversity during the Mayor's Breakfast in early March.

Sandeno Hogan won a bronze medal in the 800-meter freestyle event at the 2000 Summer Olympics in Sydney, Australia while she was still in high school. That set high expectations and drove her to train relentlessly. The path to the 2004 Olympics was difficult, but she remained focused, she told those in attendance at the Lake Forest Clubhouse Sr. Senior Center.

The 2004 Summer Olympics in Athens, Greece saw Sandeno win three more Olympic medals: silver in the 400-meter individual medley, bronze in the 400-meter freestyle, and the ultimate prize: A gold medal in the 4×200-meter freestyle relay.

She brought the medals to the Lake Forest event to share them with the audience.

Retired from competitive swimming, Sandeno is now an inspirational speaker and wrote Golden Glow. How Kaitlin Sandeno achieved Gold in the Pool and Life with coauthor Dan D'Adonna. She is also active with the Jessie Rees Foundation, which helps kids fighting cancer to remember NEGU - Never Ever Give Up!

PARK PROFILE NATURE PARK



NATURE PARK 26215 Dimension Dr. Lake Forest, CA 92630

The Nature Park is truly one of Lake Forest's hidden gems. Trails, picnic areas, and a small outdoor amphitheater are the park's main amenities. With 4.5 acres of Live Oak trees and native plant species, the Nature Park is a wonderful place to enjoy a quiet lunch or walk. Informative signage helps visitors identify local plant and wildlife.

Park trails connect to the Serrano Creek Trail allowing for easy access to hiking or bicycling. Parking is available along Dimension Drive, adjacent to the park entrance.

Did you know? The Nature Park is one of the few city park locations with full-size Coast Live Oak trees. Live Oak Trees are close to evergreen and were given that name because they remain "live" during winter months. Coast Live Oaks are also the designated City Tree.

DIY CLEANING & GARDENING

Looking for some handy and fun stay at home projects to clean and protect your home? Try using common items from your home and establish a thriving garden while also protecting our local environmental resources!

DIY PEST CONTROL AND GARDENING

DID YOU KNOW A VARIETY OF COMMON HOUSEHOLD ITEMS CAN BE USED TO REPEL INSECTS?

- The strong smell of garlic and cayenne can be used to deter a variety of bugs, especially aphids. Chopping 6 cloves of garlic and mixing them with 1 tbsp. of baby shampoo in 4 cups of water in a spray bottle creates an effective repellent for your rose bushes.
- Mixing 5 tablespoons of dish soap with 4 cups of water in a spray bottle can be used to deter aphids and spider mites
- Coffee and eggshells can be sprinkled around the base of plants to repel ants, snails, and slugs (and they are great on azaleas, rhododendrons, camellias, gardenias and even blueberries!).
- To keep wasps away from ripening fruit, fill several cans with equal parts ammonia and water, and hang them among your fruit trees.
- Trim overhanging tree limbs that might provide an insect or rodent on-ramp to your home.
- Check the areas around your home for any debris or garbage anything that could be used by pests as shelter - and get rid of it.

Insects are looking for food, water and shelter - if you eliminate these necessities, they won't forage in your home or your garden!

ENVIRONMENTALLY FRIENDLY CLEANING FOR OUTDOORS

- Use a broom and a dustpan to clean your patio and outdoor walkways instead of a hose.
- Clean your patio furniture on your lawn or other landscaped areas to save water and provide your plants with a drink
- Wash vehicles over pervious surfaces such as lawns and gravel areas. If unpaved or landscaped areas are not available, block and/or divert wash water to an area where the water can pool and evaporate throughout the day. If using cleaners (such as acid based wheel cleaners), use a rag to wipe them on and off, do not rinse them off with water.
- Use a spray nozzle on your hose with an automatic shut-off and turn the flow of water completely off when not actively washing down your
- Use soaps, cleaners or detergents labeled "non-toxic", "phosphate free", or "biodegradable". Vegetable and citrus-based products are typically safest for the environment.
- Shake floor mats onto landscaping, into trash cans or vacuum to clean, never shake off in the gutter.

By using these "green" cleaning methods, you can keep pollutants out of the storm drains that flow to our local environmental resources.

Remember, anything washed into the gutter ends up in our local creeks, lakes and the ocean. Using these
